WHITBY AUTHOR HEADS NORTH TO RESEARCH RARE PONY

Heather M. O'Connor to be artist-in-residence at Quetico Provincial Park

WHITBY, ON, July 27, 2017— Freelance writer and author Heather M. O'Connor flies up to Quetico Provincial Park next month. The Whitby writer will be artist-in-residence at the northwestern Ontario backcountry park from August 28 to September 10.

She invites visitors to join her on a writing hike Friday, September 4. As participants explore Quetico's Teaching Trail, they'll also explore their senses. After the hike, they will use the experience to create a short piece of writing. The hike begins at 7 pm at Teaching Place in the Dawson Trail Campgrounds.

Heather's two-week stay in the park's lakefront artist studio doubles as a research trip. Ms. O'Connor recently received a Marion Hebb Research Grant for a new project on the endangered Lac La Croix Indigenous Pony.

"The Anishinaabe People living around Quetico bred these horses to help them run traplines in the winter. The rest of the year the herds ran wild in the forests. Imagine that!

"Today, there are only 150 Lac La Croix ponies left. It's the only Indigenous-bred horse in Canada, one of only three Canadian breeds, but most people have never heard of it."

Ms. O'Connor's visit coincides with Quetico's Ponies in the Park event September 5 and 6. The annual meet-and-greet brings Lac La Croix ponies from Grey Raven Ranch to the park. Park visitors have an opportunity to view and learn about this friendly breed from youth in Grey Raven's Indigenous heritage program.

"I'll come face-to-face with a fascinating piece of history, one that I couldn't explore without the help of Ontario Parks and the Quetico Foundation, which support the artist in residence program, and the Access Copyright Foundation, which is funding my research."
